

Ancient Greek

The Centre for Classics and Archaeology offers a full stream of study in the ancient languages Ancient Greek and Latin, see page 261. Proficiency in both of these languages at the earliest possible stage is highly recommended for those wishing to specialize in the study of the ancient Greco-Roman world. The ancient languages therefore are a fundamental part of the major and the honours program in classics and archaeology, see page 111. Both languages are available as streamed programs of study that can be commenced from first/second year. These can commence either at beginners level or the post-VCE stream. The Centre also offers a Diploma of Arts (Ancient Languages), see page 49.

Language study streams

The Centre offers two streams of Ancient Greek:

Beginners

The beginners stream is available to students who have little or no knowledge of Ancient Greek. It is available to students at any year level, although students intending to study Ancient Greek are advised to commence their language study in their first year.

Post-VCE

The post-VCE stream is usually only available to students who have obtained a pass in VCE Ancient Greek, or its approved equivalent.

Students should note that an intermediate sub-stream of Ancient Greek is offered within both the beginners and post-VCE streams. The intermediate sub-stream is offered in alternate years.

Ancient Greek subjects

115-012 Beginners Ancient Greek A

Note: Formerly available as 104-101/201/301. Students who have completed 104-101/201/301 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: First, second and third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr C Mackie

Contact: Three hours of lectures and a 1-hour tutorial per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject teaches students to read Ancient Greek. It covers word formation, grammatical concepts, sentence formation and translation, and the reading of simple texts. Students are introduced to Ancient Greek of various styles, media and periods. The aim is for students to acquire the elements of the grammar, syntax and vocabulary of Ancient Greek, and attain reading skills, sufficient to begin reading literary and non-literary texts.

Assessment: Written work which may comprise regular exercises totalling 2000 words, and two 1-hour class tests.

115-013 Beginners Ancient Greek B

Note: Formerly available as 104-102/202/302. Students who have completed 104-102/202/302 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: First, second and third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr C Mackie

Prerequisites: 115-012 Beginners Ancient Greek A (p.49) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: Three hours of lectures and a 1-hour tutorial per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: In this subject students revise the basic elements covered in Semester 1, and are introduced to more complex grammar and syntax, as well as some of the issues involved in interpreting an ancient language. Increasingly difficult texts are read from a variety of sources. By the end of the sub-

ject students should have a sufficient grasp of the language to read texts of moderate difficulty with vocabulary assistance.

Assessment: Written work which may comprise regular exercises totalling 2000 words, and two 1-hour class tests.

115-014 Intermediate Ancient Greek A

Note: Formerly available as 104-103/203/303. Students who have completed 104-103/203/303 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: Second and third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Assoc Prof R Scott

Prerequisites: VCE Ancient Greek, 115-013 Beginners Ancient Greek B (p.49) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: Three hours of lectures and a 1-hour grammar tutorial per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject involves the reading of literary and non-literary texts; further work on grammar and syntax; translation exercises; and Ancient Greek literary criticism. Students should complete the subject having read a number of Ancient Greek texts in the original; consolidated their knowledge of grammar and syntax; and extended their vocabulary through texts in a variety of styles and genres.

Assessment: Two hours of class tests and written work, which may comprise regular exercises totalling 2000 words for second/third year, 3000 words for fourth year.

Prescribed texts: Liddell & Scott, *Greek-English Lexicon*, (abridged ed).

115-015 Intermediate Ancient Greek B

Note: Formerly available as 104-104/204/304. Students who have completed 104-104/204/304 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: Second and third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr C Mackie

Prerequisites: VCE Ancient Greek, 115-014 Intermediate Ancient Greek A (p.50) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: Three hours of lectures and a 1-hour grammar tutorial per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: This subject involves the reading of literary texts; further work on grammar and syntax; translation exercises; and Ancient Greek literary criticism. On completion of the subject students should have read a number of Ancient Greek texts in the original and consolidated their knowledge of grammar and syntax.

Assessment: Two hours of class tests and written work, which may comprise regular exercises totalling 2000 words for second/third year, 3000 words for fourth year.

Prescribed texts: Liddell & Scott, *Greek-English Lexicon*, (abridged ed).

115-018 Advanced Ancient Greek A

Note: Formerly available as 104-307. Students who have completed 104-307 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: Third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr C Mackie

Prerequisites: Two of 115-014 Intermediate Ancient Greek A (p.50), 115-018 Advanced Ancient Greek A (p.50), 115-016 Intermediate Ancient Greek C (p.50), 115-017 Intermediate Ancient Greek D (p.50) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: Three hours per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject consists of reading and discussion of literary and non-literary texts and advanced linguistic topics. Students should have read a number of Ancient Greek texts in the original, consolidating their knowledge of grammar and syntax and extending their vocabulary. Students should also have encountered a range of textual styles and genres, both literary and non-literary.

Assessment: Two hours of class tests and written work, which may comprise regular exercises totalling 2000 words for second/third year, 3000 words for fourth year.

115-019 Advanced Ancient Greek B

Note: Formerly available as 104-308. Students who have completed 104-308 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: Third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr C Mackie

Prerequisites: 115-018 Advanced Ancient Greek A (p.50), 115-030 Advanced Ancient Greek C (p.50) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: Three hours per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: This subject involves reading and discussion of literary and non-literary texts; advanced linguistic topics. On completion of the subject students should have read a number of Ancient Greek texts in the original, consolidating their knowledge of grammar and syntax and extending their vocabulary.

Assessment: Two hours of class tests and written work, which may comprise regular exercises totalling 2000 words for second/third year, 3000 words for fourth year.

Ancient Greek subjects not offered in 2001

115-016 Intermediate Ancient Greek C

Note: Formerly available as 104-105/205/305. Students who have completed 104-105/205/305 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Availability: Second and third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Prerequisites: VCE Ancient Greek, 115-013 Beginners Ancient Greek B (p.49) or an approved equivalent.

Semester: Not Offered

Description: In this subject students translate and discuss the interpretation of literary and non-literary texts deriving from both the core classical corpus and from related contexts. In the classes further work is undertaken on grammar and syntax which revises and consolidates the beginners course. Students will also undertake work in Ancient Greek literary and textual criticism. Prerequisites: VCE Ancient Greek, 115-016 Intermediate Ancient Greek C (p.50) or an approved equivalent.

Semester: Not Offered

Note: Formerly available as 104-309. Students who have completed 104-309 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Credit points: 12.5

Prerequisites: Two of 115-014 Intermediate Ancient Greek A (p.50), 115-015 Intermediate Ancient Greek B (p.50), 115-016 Intermediate Ancient Greek C (p.50), 115-017 Intermediate Ancient Greek D (p.50) or an approved equivalent.

Semester: Not Offered

Description: This subject is designed to provide the opportunity for extensive reading and class discussion of Ancient Greek literary and non-literary texts. The focus is on reading various complete texts, rather than extracts, to facilitate engagement of linguistic and hermeneutical study in a fully integrated fashion.

115-031 Advanced Ancient Greek D

Note: Formerly available as 104-310. Students who have completed 104-310 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.
