

## Arabic studies

Arabic is spoken by 180 million people around the world. The increasing trade and diplomatic exchanges between Australia and the Arabic-speaking world makes it important for students wishing to pursue a career in these areas to acquire the language and understand culture. The acquisition of Arabic language is also highly desirable for a general understanding of the Islamic world.

Arabic studies is one of a number of programs that constitute the Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies (MIALS). The Institute was established in 1998 as a major teaching and research initiative of the University of Melbourne. MIALS serves to strengthen the University's role as a major international centre for the development of studies in Asian languages and societies. Students who specialise in Arabic studies develop transferable skills that will enhance their career options. Alternatively, they are able to expand on their interest and knowledge through an articulated structure of higher degree study options at the University of Melbourne.

Arabic language classes cater for a range of competencies, from beginners-level, for students with little or no knowledge of Arabic to more advanced levels, for students with some prior knowledge of the language. Students of Arabic studies will receive a comprehensive grounding in important areas of Arabic language, society and culture.

### Language study streams

The Institute offers two streams of Arabic language study:

#### Beginners

The beginners stream is available to students who have little or no knowledge of Arabic. It is available at both first and second year although students intending to complete a major will need to commence their language study in their first year.

#### Post-VCE

The post-VCE stream is usually only available to students who have obtained a pass in VCE Arabic, or its equivalent.

The Institute determines the language stream in which a student is to enrol. Placement is based on VCE results, other language study, other language study record, or a placement test.

Stream enrolment remains provisional until confirmed or, alternatively, altered according to the student's needs as determined by the Institute during the first two weeks of teaching. As far as possible, the Institute will notify students of any changes to their stream during the first two weeks of semester. Where a change is made in the third or fourth week of semester it will be reported to the Associate Dean (Academic Programs).

### Diploma of Modern Languages (Arabic)

The Diploma of Modern Languages (DML) enables students to gain a diploma in language study in the course of completing an undergraduate degree at the University of Melbourne.

The DML usually involves a three-year sequence of language study, totalling a minimum of 100 points. It adds one year to the duration of an ordinary degree course.

The DML (Arabic) is offered in the beginners and post-VCE streams. Arabic subjects are taken alongside degree subjects in an integrated sequence of study. This must be approved by a faculty course adviser and the Head of Programs, MIALS. See *Diploma in Modern Languages* (p.44).

### Requirements for a language major

A major in Arabic studies usually consists of 125 points comprising:

- three or four first year subjects in Arabic (37.5 points) and;
- three or four second year subjects in Arabic (37.5 points) and;
- four third year subjects in Arabic (50 points).

A major must include either:

- 110-010 Arabic 3A (p.63) and;
- 110-011 Arabic 3B (p.63)

or

- 110-012 Arabic 4A (p.63) and;
- 110-013 Arabic 4B (p.63)

### Honours entry

The prerequisites for entry to Fourth Year Honours in Arabic Studies are:

- completion of all the requirements for the BA and;
- completion of a major in Arabic studies and;
- an average grade of H2B or higher over the second/third year subjects within the major;
- for combined honours, admission to honours in another area of study within the Faculty of Arts.

Entry to honours must be approved by the Arabic studies coordinator and the Faculty of Arts honours course adviser. Intending honours students must submit a well-defined proposal for an honours research project in November of the preceding year, and make arrangements for appropriate supervision with advice from the fourth year honours coordinator.

### Combined honours

Honours coordinator: Dr Abdullah Saeed

Students undertaking combined honours must have admission to honours in another area of study within the Faculty of Arts. Students undertaking combined honours in Arabic studies and another area of study must complete:

- 110-530 Arabic Studies Thesis (p.64) or 110-531 Arabic Studies Thesis (MYE) (p.64) (37.5 points) and;
- two honours subjects in Arabic studies (25 points) and;
- three honours subjects in the combined area of study (37.5).

or

- honours thesis in the combined area of study (37.5 points) and;
- two honours subjects in the combined area of study (25 points) and;
- three honours subjects in Arabic studies (37.5 points).

In either case the following two subjects must be included in the Arabic studies component of the combined Honours year, unless they have been completed earlier:

- 110-012 Arabic 4A (p.63)
- 110-013 Arabic 4B (p.63)

or

- 110-021 Arabic 5A (p.64)
- 110-022 Arabic 5B (p.64)

## Pure honours

Students undertaking pure honours in Arabic studies must complete:

- 110-530 Arabic Studies Thesis (p.64) or 110-531 Arabic Studies Thesis (MYE) (p.64) (37.5 points) and;

Normally at least two subjects must be completed from the following unless completed earlier:

- 110-012 Arabic 4A (p.63)
- 110-013 Arabic 4B (p.63)
- 110-021 Arabic 5A (p.64)
- 110-022 Arabic 5B (p.64)

Normally no more than three subjects from the following:

- 110-016 Research Essay (Arabic) (p.64)
- 110-017 Directed Study Project (Arabic Studies) (p.64)
- 110-018 Islam and Questioning of Modernity (p.242)
- 110-019 Researching Islam and Muslim Societies (p.242)

## Further study

An honours degree in Arabic studies can lead to MA or PhD degrees.

## Language subjects

### 110-002 Arabic 1A

**Note:** Formerly available as 150-101/201/301. Students who have completed 150-101/201/301 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

**Availability:** First and second year

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Assoc Prof A Saeed & Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-003 Arabic 1A-Conversation (p.62).

**Contact:** Four hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

**Description:** This subject is an introduction to spoken and written Arabic language as well as culture for students with little or no knowledge of Arabic. On completion of the subject students should have acquired; a spoken facility at a basic level in Modern Standard Arabic; the ability to read and understand a range of simple Arabic texts and stories within a vocabulary range of 200-400 most commonly used words; some basic grammatical structures of Arabic language; the ability to write simple journal entries relating to the themes focused on in the semester; and a familiarity with some Arab cultural practices and traditions.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour written examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test.

**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed, *Modern Standard Arabic Book 1*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies. • A Saeed, *Reading and Pronunciation*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies. • A Saeed, *Introduction to Arabic Script*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.

### 110-003 Arabic 1A-Conversation

**Availability:** First and second year

**Credit points:** 6.25

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-002 Arabic 1A (p.62).

**Contact:** Two hours of tutorials per week (*Semester 1*).

**Description:** In this subject students will learn to interact and express themselves in spoken Arabic, both in formal and informal situations. A range of topics appropriate for day-to-day conversation in Arabic will be covered. This subject complements work in 110-002 Arabic 1A (p.62). It reinforces grammar and vocabulary learned in that subject.

**Assessment:** Two 15-minute aural/oral tests and a 30-minute aural/oral test.

**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed, *Beginners' Arabic Conversation 1*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.

### 110-004 Arabic 1B

**Note:** Formerly available as 150-102/202/302. Students who have completed 150-102/202/302 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

**Availability:** First and second year

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Assoc Prof A Saeed & Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** 110-002 Arabic 1A (p.62) or equivalent. Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-005 Arabic 1B-Conversation (p.62).

**Contact:** Four hours of language classes per week (*Semester 2*).

**Description:** This subject forms a thorough introduction to spoken and written Arabic language and culture for students with some knowledge of Arabic. On completion of the subject students will have acquired: a clear spoken facility at a basic level in Modern Standard Arabic; the ability to read and understand a variety of Arabic texts within a vocabulary range of 500-1000 most commonly used words; basic grammatical structures of Arabic language, and attained the capacity to apply them in speech and writing; have the ability to write simple letters to friends, and make journal entries relating to everyday activities; and a familiarity with a number of important Arab cultural habits and traditions.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test.

**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed, *Modern Standard Arabic. Book 2*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.

### 110-005 Arabic 1B-Conversation

**Note:** First and second year

**Credit points:** 6.25

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-004 Arabic 1B (p.62).

**Contact:** Two hours of tutorials per week (*Semester 2*).

**Description:** In this subject students will learn to interact and express themselves in spoken Arabic, both in formal and informal situations. A wide range of topics appropriate for day-to-day conversation in Arabic will be covered. This subject complements work in 110-004 Arabic 1B (p.62). It reinforces grammar and vocabulary learned in that subject.

**Assessment:** Two 15-minute aural/oral tests and a 30-minute aural/oral test.

**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed, *Beginners' Arabic Conversation 2*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.

### 110-006 Arabic 2A

**Note:** Formerly available as 150-103/203/303. Students who have completed 150-103/203/303 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

**Availability:** Second and third year

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** 110-004 Arabic 1B (p.62) or equivalent. Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-007 Arabic 2A-Conversation (p.63).

**Contact:** Four hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

**Description:** This subject involves a more detailed presentation of functions of the language; oral and aural practice; reading of texts, and the writing of compositions that incorporate features of the language already presented through some important cultural issues. On completion of this subject students should have acquired: a level of proficiency in basic Arabic conversational forms; a level of proficiency in simple written structures and an ability to formulate such structures; an understanding of some of the commonly used grammatical structures of Arabic and the ability to apply them in speech and writing; the ability to interpret messages of a low level of complexity occurring in some audio-visual media and in individual and group spoken forms; familiarity with some of the dominant cultural ideas and forms in the Arab Middle East.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test.

**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed, *Modern Standard Arabic. Book 3*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.

**110-007 Arabic 2A-Conversation****Availability:** Second and third year**Credit points:** 6.25**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah**Prerequisites:** Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-006 Arabic 2A (p.62).**Contact:** Two hours of tutorials per week (*Semester 1*).**Description:** In this subject students will learn to interact and express themselves in spoken Arabic, both in formal and informal situations. A wide range of topics appropriate for day-to-day conversation in Arabic will be covered. This subject complements work in 110-006 Arabic 2A (p.62). It also deals with some important cultural issues, including modern Arabic literary movements and ideas. On completion of this subject students should have acquired: proficiency in basic idiomatic and conversational forms and ability to converse freely using these forms; written structures of moderate complexity and an ability to formulate such structures clearly and accurately; a grounding in commonly used grammatical structures of Arabic and an ability to apply them in speech and writing; the ability to interpret messages at an intermediate level of complexity; familiarity with major cultural issues and modern literary movements and ideas in the 20th century in the Arab Middle East.**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test.**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed, *Modern Standard Arabic. Book 4*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.**110-009 Arabic 2B-Conversation****Availability:** Second and third year**Credit points:** 6.25**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah**Prerequisites:** Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-008 Arabic 2B (p.63).**Contact:** Two hours of tutorials per week (*Semester 2*).**Description:** In this subject students will learn to interact and express themselves in spoken Arabic, both in formal and informal situations. Students should become conversant in some aspects of advanced Arabic syntax and morphology, the historical development of Arabic language and literature up to the modern period

including some examples of literary writing in the modern period, and translation of texts of moderate difficulty from Arabic to English and English to Arabic. Students will choose any four units from the following: speaking; writing; translation; Arabic literature; grammar; guided reading; and research methods.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test.**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed & A S Abdullah, *Advanced Arabic Texts 1*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.**110-011 Arabic 3B****Note:** Formerly available as 150-106/206/306. Students who have completed 150-106/206/306 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.**Availability:** First, second and third year**Credit points:** 12.5**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah**Prerequisites:** 110-010 Arabic 3A (p.63) or equivalent.**Contact:** Four hours of language classes per week (*Semester 2*).**Description:** This subject will develop students' skills such as: using idiomatic and conversational forms freely in speech; proficiency in written structures of moderate complexity and the capacity to use such structures clearly and accurately; interpreting messages of a medium level of complexity occurring in a variety of audio-visual media and individual and group spoken forms. It will also cover the role and function of stylistic complexity in Arabic, the development of Arabic literature in the modern period including some examples of writing in the period and translation of texts of moderate difficulty in non-technical language from Arabic to English and vice versa using dictionaries. Students will choose any four units from the following: speaking; writing; translation; Arabic literature; grammar; guided reading; and research methods.**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test.**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed & A S Abdullah, *Advanced Arabic Texts 2*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.**110-012 Arabic 4A****Note:** Formerly available as 150-207/307/407. Students who have completed 150-207 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.**Availability:** Second and third year**Credit points:** 12.5**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Assoc Prof A Saeed & Dr A S Abdullah**Prerequisites:** 110-011 Arabic 3B (p.63) or equivalent.**Contact:** Four hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).**Description:** This subject will develop skills such as: a refined use of idiomatic and conversational forms; a level of proficiency in written structures of sophisticated complexity and the capacity to command their use freely; and an independent style in written language use. It will also cover some principles of analysis of Modern Arabic literary texts and application of such principles, some of the important issues in modern Arabic literature and translation of Arabic texts of medium level difficulty. Text types may include biographies, diaries, drama, short stories, collected letters, articles, essays and novels. Students will choose any four units from the following: speaking; writing; translation; Arabic literature; grammar; guided reading; and research methods.**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test. Fourth year students will write an additional essay of 1000 words.**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed & A S Abdullah, *Advanced Arabic Texts 3*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.**110-013 Arabic 4B****Note:** Formerly available as 150-208/308/408. Students who have completed 150-208/308/408 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.**Availability:** Second and third year**Credit points:** 12.5**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Assoc Prof A Saeed & Dr A S Abdullah**Prerequisites:** 110-012 Arabic 4A (p.63) or equivalent.**Contact:** Four hours of language classes per week (*Semester 2*).**Description:** This subject will develop students' skills such as proficiency in written structures of sophisticated complexity and the capacity to decode and evaluate specialist and technical language use. It will also cover a variety of issues in modern Arabic literature and literary criticism, the historical, cultural, economic and political factors that have conditioned the emergence of Arabic as an international language, as well as translation of texts of medium to high level of difficulty. Students will choose any four units from the follow-

ing; speaking; writing; translation; Arabic literature; grammar; guided reading; and research methods.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 1500 words, a 2-hour examination and a 15-minute aural/oral test. Fourth year students will write an additional essay of 1000 words.

**Prescribed texts:** A Saeed & A S Abdullah, *Advanced Arabic Texts 4*, Melbourne Institute of Asian Languages and Societies.

### 110-021 Arabic 5A

**Availability:** Third and fourth year

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Assoc Prof A Saeed & Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** 110-012 Arabic 4A (*p.63*) or 110-013 Arabic 4B (*p.63*) or equivalent.

**Contact:** Regular meetings with the supervisor (*Semester 1*).

**Description:** This is a reading subject for students who have completed 110-012 Arabic 4A (*p.63*) or 110-013 Arabic 4B (*p.63*) or equivalent. Readings will be selected in consultation with the student in the first week of the semester and should be completed in line with the guidelines provided to the student. Focus in will be on one area of Arabic studies: literature. Students enrolling in this subject should be able to undertake a small-scale research project in Arabic literature and present the findings in a scholarly manner.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 5000 words.

**Prescribed texts:**

Readings are selected in consultation with the student.

### 110-022 Arabic 5B

**Availability:** Third and fourth year

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Assoc Prof A Saeed & Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** Completion of 110-013 Arabic 4B (*p.63*) or equivalent.

**Contact:** Regular meetings with the supervisor (*Semester 2*).

**Description:** This is a reading subject for students who have completed 110-012 Arabic 4A (*p.63*) or 110-013 Arabic 4B (*p.63*) or equivalent. Readings will be selected in consultation with the student in the first week of the semester and should be completed in line with the guidelines provided to the student. Focus in will be on one area of Arabic studies: linguistics. Students enrolling in this subject should be able to undertake a small-scale research project in Arabic linguistics and present the findings in a scholarly manner.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 5000 words.

**Prescribed texts:**

Readings are selected in consultation with the student.

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Dr A S Abdullah & Dr M Kamal

**Prerequisites:** 37.5 points at second/third year in Arabic or a related area; for further information contact the subject coordinator.

**Contact:** Regular meetings with the supervisor (*Semester 1, repeat 2*).

**Description:** A research essay on a topic related to Arabic studies or Islamic studies. The essay may be written in English or in Arabic.

**Assessment:** An essay totalling 4000 words for third year, 5000 words for fourth year.

### 110-017 Directed Study Project (Arabic Studies)

**Note:** Formerly available as 150-315/415. Students who have completed 150-315/415 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

**Credit points:** 12.5

**HECS-band:** 1

**Coordinator:** Dr M Kamal & Dr A S Abdullah

**Prerequisites:** Students must be concurrently enrolled in 110-010 Arabic 3A (*p.63*) or 110-011 Arabic 3B (*p.63*) or equivalent.

**Contact:** Regular meetings with the Supervisor (*Semester 1, repeat 2*).

**Description:** This subject involves a special study based on the student's other subjects taken previously or concurrently. Readings can be in any of the following two main areas: Arabic literature or Islamic studies. Students completing this subject should be able to undertake a small scale research project in Arabic Studies or Islamic studies in an area of interest to them and consistent with the aim of the subject; present the findings of their research in a scholarly manner. This subject may be taken more than once in consultation with the Head of Arabic Studies.

**Assessment:** Written work totalling 4000 words for third year, 5000 words for fourth year.

**Prescribed texts:**

Selected texts will be based on the student's research project.
