

Italian

Italian studies at the University of Melbourne offers the most comprehensive program in Victoria. Students from all faculties have the opportunity to study the language and literature of one of the richest cultures in Europe. Multiple entry points are provided from beginners to advanced levels of language proficiency through the concurrent diploma and international exchange and study abroad. The emphasis on practical language acquisition and the study of Italian culture make Italian a rewarding option for all students. Students are able to select from a comprehensive and fascinating range of subjects in areas of linguistics, dialects, literature and contemporary cultural studies. Taught by staff with strong research interests and expertise in these areas, the program equips students with an excellent grounding in Italian language, literature and culture and provides avenues into exciting career opportunities. Students who are interested in expanding their interests and knowledge in Italian studies are provided with an articulated structure of higher degree study at the University of Melbourne.

Language study streams

The Department of French and Italian Studies offers three streams of Italian:

Beginners

The beginners stream is for students who have little or no knowledge of Italian. It is available to students at first and second year although students intending to complete a major will need to commence their language study in their first year.

Intermediate

The intermediate stream is usually only available to students who have undertaken 4-5 years of secondary school Italian, normally to Year 11, or an approved equivalent. It is not available to those who have sat for VCE Italian or equivalent.

Post-VCE

The post-VCE stream is usually only available to students who have obtained a pass in VCE Italian, or its equivalent.

Students who have not formally studied VCE Italian, but believe they have achieved an equivalent competence, must receive written permission from the Italian Part 1 coordinator before enrolling.

The Department determines the language stream in which a student is to enrol. Placement is based on VCE results, other language study record, or a placement test.

Stream enrolment remains provisional until confirmed or, alternatively, altered according to the student's needs as determined by the Department during the first two weeks of teaching. As far as possible, the Department will notify students of any changes to their stream enrolment during the first two weeks of semester. Where a change is made in the third or fourth week of semester it will be reported to Associate Dean (Academic Programs).

Diploma in Modern Languages (Italian)

The Diploma in Modern Languages (DML) enables students to gain a diploma in language study while completing an undergraduate degree at the University of Melbourne.

The DML usually involves a three-year sequence of language study, totalling a minimum of 100 points. It adds one year to the duration of an ordinary degree course.

The DML (Italian) is offered in the beginners, intermediate and post-VCE streams. Italian subjects are taken alongside degree subjects in an integrated sequence of study. This must be approved by a faculty course adviser and the Italian section of the French and Italian Department. See *Diploma in Modern Languages* (p.44).

Requirements for a major

A major in Italian usually consists of 125 points comprising:

- four first year subjects in Italian (37.5 points) and;
- second year subjects in Italian (totalling 37.5 points) and;
- four third year subjects in Italian (50 points).

A major must include either:

- 116-067 Italian Part 3A Language 1 (Compulsory) (p.246)
- or
- 116-064 Italian Part 3 Language 1 (Compulsory) (p.246)

Honours entry

The prerequisites for entry to Fourth Year Honours in Italian are:

- completion of all the requirements for the BA and;
- completion of a major in Italian, which must include 116-071 To Hell with Dante (p.247) in third year and;
- an average grade of H2B or higher over the second/third year subjects within the major.

In exceptional circumstances 116-071 To Hell with Dante (p.247) may be undertaken as a fourth year subject.

Entry to honours must be approved by the Italian honours coordinator and the Faculty of Arts honours course adviser.

Honours requirements

Pure honours

Students undertaking pure honours in Italian must complete:

- 116-506 Italian Thesis (p.248) or 116-507 Italian Thesis (MYE) (p.248) (37.5 points) and;
- 116-068 Italian Honours Language Seminar 1 (p.248) (12.5 points) and;
- four honours subjects in Italian (50 points).

Combined honours

Students undertaking combined honours in Italian and another area of study must complete:

- 116-506 Italian Thesis (p.248) or 116-507 Italian Thesis (MYE) (p.248) (37.5 points) and;
- 116-068 Italian Honours Language Seminar 1 (p.248) (12.5 points) and;
- one honours subject in Italian (12.5 points) and;
- three honours subjects from the combined area of study (37.5 points).

or

- honours thesis in the combined area of study (37.5 points) and;
- two honours subjects in the combined area of study (25 points) and;
- 116-068 Italian Honours Language Seminar 1 (p.248) (12.5 points) and;
- two honours subjects in Italian (25 points).

Further study

A BA with a major in Italian can lead to a Postgraduate Diploma in Arts (Italian).

The Section also offers the MA and PhD by research. Students interested in postgraduate study should consult the departmental postgraduate information booklet and make an appointment to see the postgraduate coordinator. An MA in Applied Linguistics with Italian (coursework and minor thesis) is also available.

Career opportunities

The training acquired in learning a language and the practical competence involved in using it effectively provide skills that are of great value in a variety of occupations and appreciated by many employers. Such skills are increasingly considered essential in a number of professions, for example in international trade, law, diplomacy, journalism, social and medical services, and many others.

Former students have followed successful and rewarding careers as interpreters, journalists, librarians and teachers. Many have found employment in public relations, the media, the airline industry, travel and tourism, and in business. Italy is now one of the major industrialised nations, making knowledge of Italian a valuable asset for those embarking on a business career.

Prerequisites: Students who have attempted Year 12 Italian or its equivalent are not eligible to enrol.

Corequisites: Students must be concurrently enrolled in 116-050 Beginners Italian Part 1B (p.244).

Contact: Three hours of language classes and one hour of conversation class per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject provides a comprehensive introduction to contemporary Italian. Language classes will familiarise students with the structures, rules and skills necessary to communicate in Italian. A weekly conversation class assists the language learning process and improves spoken and listening fluency. Continuous assessment, through tests, exercises, and other activities, is fundamental to ascertaining the student's progress in the acquisition of Italian. By the end of the semester, students should have developed oral and written skills that will enable them to achieve a reasonable level of competency in Italian.

Assessment: Class tests and written work totalling 2000 words, language assignments totalling 1000 words and a 1-hour test.

Description: This subject is designed to assist the language learning of students already enrolled in 116-049 Beginners Italian Part 1A (p.244). A

weekly language laboratory class will, by means of audio as well as video, music, and computer activities, reinforce and improve students' understanding, use and pronunciation of Italian. A weekly lecture/seminar will be devoted to practical language learning issues, and then to an introduction to Italian literature and culture. By the end of the semester students should have acquired the skills necessary to read and discuss simple literary texts.

Assessment: A 500 word quiz, a 500 word dictation test and a 1-hour exam.

Weekly language laboratory classes, by means of audio as well as video, music and computer activities, reinforce and improve students' understanding, use and pronunciation of Italian. By the end of the academic year students should have the skills necessary to read and discuss simple literary texts written in Italian.

Assessment: A 1-hour exam, a 500 word assignment and a 500 word dictation.

Corequisites: Students must be concurrently enrolled in 116-053 Italian Part 1: Textual Studies A (p.244).

Contact: Three hours language classes and a 1-hour lecture per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject provides students with intensive revision and further exploration of the major areas of the Italian language. The subject combines the analysis of grammatical structures, vocabulary and idiom with practical exercises designed to increase the student's linguistic competence in a variety of areas: comprehension, essay writing, spoken Italian. Students will also undertake background study in a cultural/historical topic. By the end of the subject students should have developed their spoken, written and comprehension skills.

Assessment: A 2-hour written test, class tests and written work totalling 1000 words and an essay of 1000 words.

116-053 Italian Part 1: Textual Studies A

Corequisites: Students must be concurrently enrolled in 116-052 Italian Part 1:Language & Culture A (p.244).

Contact: A lecture and a 1-hour tutorial per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject introduces students to the study of literary texts and/or films in Italian, principally novels and short stories. Students will be provided with strategies for reading substantial texts in Italian and with ways of generally increasing comprehension of written Italian. The subject will also provide a basic introduction to a number of methodologies for analysing literary texts. The central part of the subject will consist of detailed readings of the texts concerned in order to elucidate their major themes and their relationship with the historical and social context of modern Italy. By the end of the subject students should have improved their reading skills; developed critical methodologies for interpreting literary texts; and gained some understanding of the context of the texts studied. The subject will be taught in Italian.

Assessment: Two essays of 1000 words each.

Description: This subject continues the study of significant literary texts and/or films in Italian begun in 116-053 Italian Part 1:Textual Studies A (p.244). Students will be given guidance in reading texts in Italian and in ways of generally increasing comprehension of written Italian. The subject will also provide a basic introduction to a number of methodologies for analysing literary texts. The focus of the subject will consist of detailed readings of the texts concerned in order to elucidate their major themes and their relationship with the historical and social context of modern Italy. By the end of the subject students should have improved their reading skills; developed critical methodologies for interpreting literary texts; and gained some understanding of the context of the texts studied. The subject will be taught in Italian.

Assessment: Two essays of 1000 words each.

116-057 Intermediate Italian A

Contact: Three hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject is a systematic revision and consolidation of the basic structures of the Italian language. Grammatical explanations will be integrated through regular weekly exercises, oral and written, and in a weekly conversation practice hour, so as to extend the range of vocabulary and improve fluency. By the end of the first semester, students should have consolidated their knowledge of the basic structures of Italian, acquired the knowledge to compare and contrast features of English and Italian vocabulary and syntax, and attained a reasonable level of competence in written and oral production.

Assessment: Written tests totalling 3000 words and take-home assignments totalling 1000 words.

They should also have acquired the ability to examine critically various aspects of Italian history and culture.

Assessment: Two essays of 1500 words each and a 1000 word class paper.

By the end of the subject, students should have been introduced to a small number of literary texts and/or films in order to improve their standard of comprehension and to gain some understanding of the process of literary/cultural criticism. They should also have acquired the ability to examine critically various aspects of Italian history and culture.

Assessment: Two essays of 1500 words each and a 1000 word class paper.

Corequisites: Students must be concurrently enrolled in 116-060 Italian Part 2:Cultural Studies (p.245).

Contact: Three hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject focuses on the spoken and written language of present day Italy. Students will undertake regular exercises in composition and translation, and other language activities in order to improve their language skills. They will also participate in regular conversation practice for the purpose of reinforcing their command of current idiomatic Italian. By the end of the subject, students should have improved their written production skills, and should be able to express themselves with fluency on most topics of a general nature.

Assessment: Written tests totalling 2000 words, written work totalling 1000 words and a 1000 word class paper.

116-062 Italian Part 2:Advanced Language 2

Description: As for 116-061 Italian Part 2:Advanced Language 1 (p.246).

Assessment: Written work and class tests totalling 4000 words.

116-064 Italian Part 3 Language 1 (Compulsory)

Availability: Third year

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr D Bressan

Prerequisites: Completion of 116-061 Italian Part 2:Advanced Language 1 (p.246) and 116-062 Italian Part 2:Advanced Language 2 (p.246).

Contact: Three hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject involves a detailed analysis of a number of contemporary Italian texts, literary and non-literary, for the purpose of familiarising students with various registers and styles. Students will undertake exercises in translation (from and into Italian) with an emphasis on those features which are most likely to present challenges to speakers of English. There is also regular conversation practice on prescribed texts and exercises in written composition. The modern literature section provides an opportunity for students to practise their spoken Italian through the study of a modern literary text. By the end of the semester, students should have further developed their written and oral production skills and should have acquired the ability to competently discuss literary texts in Italian.

Assessment: Class tests and written work totalling 1000 words, two hours of written tests, a 15-minute class paper and a 15-minute oral test.

116-065 Italian Part 3 Language 2

Prerequisites: 116-064 Italian Part 3 Language 1 (Compulsory) (p.246) or 116-067 Italian Part 3A Language 1 (Compulsory) (p.246).

Contact: Three hours of language classes per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: This subject will focus on a number of texts in contemporary Italian, to acquaint students with some of the main non-literary registers (e.g. journalistic, bureaucratic etc.). It also includes a study of Jakobson's linguistic functions and of a variety of styles in writing. There will be emphasis on advanced non-literary translation, especially in problem areas. On completion of this subject, students should have refined their linguistic skills, both written and oral; have become acquainted with the notion of linguistic function; and have acquired the ability to discuss in Italian, both orally and in writing, extended texts, literary and non-literary.

Assessment: Take-home assignments totalling 1000 words, a 15-minute class paper, 1 hour of written tests, a 15-minute oral test and a 1000-word composition in Italian.

116-067 Italian Part 3A Language 1 (Compulsory)

Prerequisites: Completion of 116-057 Intermediate Italian A (p.245), 116-058 Intermediate Italian B (p.245) and 116-059 Intermediate Italian C (p.245).

Contact: Three hours of language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject involves intensive practice in advanced translation from and into Italian, and advanced Italian composition. Students will be exposed to, and will work through, a number of different styles and registers. Students will undertake the study of one or more works of contemporary literature for the purpose of extending vocabulary and practising Italian conversation. By the end of the semester, students should have learnt to identify, and correctly use, the main registers of Italian, spoken and written; acquired the skills to translate from and into Italian texts in different registers; improved their composition skills; and acquired the ability to discuss in Italian, both orally and in writing, extended prose texts.

Assessment: Class tests and written work totalling 1000 words, two hours of written tests, a 15-minute class paper and a 15-minute oral test.

Prerequisites: 37.5 points of second year Italian either at advanced or post-beginners level. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 25 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites* (p.167).

Contact: Fortnightly meetings with the supervisor (*Semester 1, repeat 2*).

Description: For this subject, students must complete a 5000 word research project in English or Italian on a topic to be approved by their supervisor and by the subject coordinator. The subject's aim is to train students in carrying out a substantial piece of work in preparation for the fourth year honours thesis. The areas of research may be connected with the subjects offered this year, or in another area connected with the research interests of staff. On completion of the project, students should have extended and deepened their knowledge of the chosen topic; sharpened their critical faculties in relation to source material and secondary literature; and acquired substantial skills in planning and executing a research program on a specific topic.

Assessment: Written work totalling 5000 words.

Contact: A 1-hour lecture and a 1.5-hour seminar per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: Students who complete this subject should be able to demonstrate an in-depth knowledge of a particular area of Italian cultural/literary studies or linguistics. Students should also have developed methodologies appropriate to the topic being studied.

Prerequisites: 37.5 points of Italian at intermediate or Post-VCE level for third year. Admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites* (p.167).

Contact: A 1-hour lecture and a 1.5-hour seminar per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject concentrates on selected cantos of Dante's *Inferno*. Students will develop techniques which should enable them to analyse the poetic language of the *Inferno*. Guided readings in secondary material should give students an understanding of some of the key medieval concepts of the *Inferno*. The subject is designed so that students will be in a position to appreciate and analyse one of the most impressive poems in Italian literature. By the end of the subject students should have acquired some understanding of the basic theological, philosophical and literary concepts of the *Inferno* and have developed critical strategies for interpreting its poetry.

Assessment: A 2-hour test and an essay of 2000 words for third year, 3000 words for fourth year.

116-074 Sex and Power in the Renaissance

Note: Formerly available as 116-362. Students who have completed 116-362 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr S Kolsky

Prerequisites: 37.5 points of Italian at intermediate or Post-VCE level for third year. Admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites* (p.167).

Contact: A 1-hour lecture and a 1.5-hour seminar per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: The subject will examine two classics of Italian literature, Boccaccio's *Decameron* and Machiavelli's *Il Principe*. The first, composed in the 1350s, is a classic of comic writing which became an essential reference-point for later writers. Students will study a selected number of stories to understand their narrative structures and their major themes. *Il Principe* is the foundation work of modern political science. Its reputation has ensured continuing interest in such a provocative work. By the end of the subject students should have acquired a basic knowledge of Renaissance culture and politics. Students should also have gained an understanding of narratological analysis and applied it to the *Decameron*.

Assessment: A class paper of 1000 words and a 3000-word essay for third year, 4000 words for fourth year.

Prescribed texts: G Boccaccio, *Decameron*, Garzanti. • N Machiavelli, *Il Principe*, Feltrinelli.

116-075 Italian Neoclassicism and Romanticism

Note: Formerly available as 116-363. Students who have completed 116-363 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr D Bressan

Prerequisites: 37.5 points at either post-beginners or post-VCE sequence for third year, admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites* (p.167).

Contact: A 1.5 hour lecture and a 1.5 hour seminar per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: This subject has three directions, according to the writers under consideration. In the case of Neoclassicism, the principal focus will be provided by the poetry of Ugo Foscolo which will be considered within a broader sociological and artistic framework. In the case of Romanticism, the poetry of Giacomo Leopardi will be considered within the context of European Romanticism characterised by the importance given to sensibility, spontaneity and originality, as well as the necessary uniqueness of form and language. Alessandro Manzoni's novel, *I promessi sposi* will be considered as a specific product of Italian Romanticism. Students who complete the subject should be able to comprehend and appreciate the meaning of the terms Neoclassicism and Romanticism and develop techniques of analysis of both prose and poetic texts.

Assessment: A 1-hour class paper and two essays totalling 3000 words for third year, 4000 words for fourth year.

116-076 The Story of Italian

Note: Formerly available as 116-366. Students who have completed 116-366 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Credit points: 12.5

HECS-band: 1

Coordinator: Dr D Bressan & Dr J Hajek

Prerequisites: 37.5 points of Italian at intermediate or Post-VCE level for third year. Admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites* (p.167).

Contact: A lecture and a 1.5-hour seminar per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: This subject begins with a study of the history of the language, which describes the development of the Italian language since its Indo-European origins; the linguistic situation in Roman Italy; the fragmentation of Latin; and the genesis of present day Italian dialects. The subject will also focus on the questione della lingua and the ascendancy of Tuscan/Roman. The 'dialectology' section of the subject involves an introduction to the study of one regional dialect. On completion of this subject, students should have acquired a basic knowledge of the structures of Latin to the extent that they are reflected in present day Italian; a knowledge of the development of Italian from post-classical Latin to the language spoken in contemporary Italy, and the reasons for that development; and a basic knowledge of the structures of one major Italian dialect.

Assessment: Written work totalling 2000 words for third year, 3000 words for fourth year and 2 hours of class tests.

Prescribed texts: S Lanuzza, *Storia della lingua italiana*, Newton.

116-078 Italian Special Subject

Description: The honours thesis in Italian provides students with the opportunity to develop research techniques and to benefit from the experience of researching and writing an independent thesis on a topic of their choice. The thesis is normally written in Italian but special permission may be obtained from the head of the Italian section for the thesis to be written in English. The main areas of specialization are Italian linguistics, dialectology, phonology, sociolinguistics, applied linguistics, Italian literature from the Middle Ages to the present. It is also possible to negotiate theses on other topics with the permission of the Head of the Italian section after consultation with the appropriate lecturer.

Assessment: A thesis of 12 000 words (a 1000 word summary in Italian is required when the thesis is in English).

116-507 Italian Thesis (MYE)

Prerequisites: Mid-year admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian.

Contact: Regular meetings with the supervisor (*Semester 1, repeat 2*).

Description: The honours thesis in Italian provides students with the opportunity to develop research techniques and to benefit from the experience of researching and writing an independent thesis on a topic of their choice. The thesis is normally written in Italian but special permission may be obtained from the head of the Italian section for the thesis to be written in English. The main areas of specialization are Italian linguistics, dialectology, phonology, sociolinguistics, applied linguistics, Italian literature from the Middle Ages to the present. It is also possible to negotiate theses on other topics with the permission of the Head of the Italian section after consultation with the appropriate lecturer.

Assessment: A thesis of 12 000 words (a 1000 word summary in Italian is required when the thesis is in English).

116-068 Italian Honours Language Seminar 1

Note: Formerly available as 116-410. Students who have completed 116-410 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Credit points: 12.5**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Dr Dino Bressan

Prerequisites: Admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian.

Contact: Two hours of advanced language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: This subject will focus on a variety of authentic texts representing both literary and non-literary genres as a stimulus for discussion and conversation practice. Advanced exercises in translation from and into Italian and in Italian composition will be set for the purpose of studying syntax and style in the appropriate registers. Each student will present an assessable class paper on a topic to be agreed with the lecturer. On completion of this subject, students should have acquired the ability to comprehend, analyse and inter-

pret complex texts, both literary and non-literary, and the ability to use actively a variety of registers and styles in contemporary Italian.

Assessment: Written work totalling 1000 words, a 20-minute class paper, two hours of written tests and a 20-minute oral test.

116-069 Italian Honours Language Seminar 2

Credit points: 12.5**HECS-band:** 1**Coordinator:** Ms Vita Giordano

Prerequisites: 116-068 Italian Honours Language Seminar 1 (p.248).

Contact: Two hours of advanced language classes per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: This subject is intended to focus on the linguistic analysis of texts from non-mainstream literature as a stimulus to discussion and conversation practice. The texts may include material in some of the principal dialects of Italy. The subject will also include advanced take-home exercises in composition with the purpose of refining syntax and style. Each student will present an assessable class paper on a topic to be negotiated with the lecturer at the beginning of the semester.

Assessment: Written work totalling 3000 words, a 20-minute class paper, a 20-minute oral test and take-home assignments totalling 1000 words.

116-072 Dante 2

Credit points: 12.5**HECS-band:** 1

Prerequisites: 37.5 points at either post-beginners or post-VCE sequence for third year, admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year. European studies students wishing to enrol in this subject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites* (p.167).

Semester: Not Offered

Description: This subject will complete the study of the *Divina commedia* begun with the *Inferno*. It will build on techniques already acquired by students in their previous study of Dante. The subject will place the two *cantiche* in their medieval context so that students will be able to grasp more easily the originality of Dante's poem. The historical and political context of *Purgatorio* and *Paradiso* will be examined in order to render the two *cantiche* more accessible to the students. By the end of the subject students should be able to analyse the poetic techniques employed by Dante. Students should have acquired an understanding of medieval culture in order to appreciate *Purgatorio* and *Paradiso* in their historical context.

116-073 Italian as She is Spoke

Credit points: 12.5**HECS-band:** 1

Prerequisites: 37.5 points at either post-beginners or post-VCE sequence for third year, admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year.

Semester: Not Offered

Description: The *Advanced Language Studies* component of this subject focuses on the phonological system and intonation patterns of present day standard Italian; word order, theme and rheme, position of adjectives and other important areas of Italian syntax. The subject is a study of the structures of Italian, which are contrasted with those of English in order to highlight the differences of the two languages. The *Varieties of Italian* component will focus on a range of varieties of Italian in use today. We will examine the description of different types of Italian and discuss factors (e.g. regional, social, cultural and political) that may influence such variation. The subject will also look at the role today of Italian on the world stage and the influence of other languages on different sectors of the Italian language. The subject is both descriptive and practical and is intended to assist students with a better understanding of Italian in its many contexts.

116-077 Modern Italian Theatre

Note: Formerly available as 116-367. Students who have completed 116-367 are not eligible to enrol in this subject.

Credit points: 12.5**HECS-band:** 1

Prerequisites: 37.5 points at either post-beginners or post-VCE sequence for third year, admission to the Postgraduate Diploma or Fourth Year Honours in Italian for fourth year. European studies students wishing to enrol in this sub-

ject would normally have completed 37.5 points of European studies at second/third year, see *Prerequisites (p.167)*.

Semester: Not Offered

Description: This subject will examine a selection of the most significant dramatic texts of modern Italian literature from the 18th to the 20th centuries. The subject will concentrate on a number of key texts written by Goldoni, Pirandello and others. Students will be asked to pay particular attention to the structural features of the plays studied, relating them, where appropriate, to current theoretical concerns and to the social and ideological context of the plays. In particular, the subject will examine the work of Dario Fo and Franca Rame in the context of the politicisation of the theatrical tradition. Students should have acquired, by the end of the subject, a knowledge of some of the landmarks in modern Italian theatre; and have developed an awareness of the critical dimensions of analysing the theatrical text and its relationship to performance.
