

International studies

The Department of Political Science offers both a major in international studies for Bachelor of Arts students, and a Diploma of Arts (International Studies) for students enrolled in a degree course at the University of Melbourne.

International studies at the University of Melbourne explores issues relating to the shifting dynamics of global politics. International studies investigates major social, political, and cultural issues that dominate the international agenda.

Students undertaking a major in international studies or the concurrent diploma can study the languages, cultures, societies, and politics of other countries, as well as examining relations between them at either the regional or global levels. Students will gain theoretical expertise and practical and empirical knowledge in a range of skills relating to international studies. Students can choose to focus on a range of topics, including traditional and critical international relations, international diplomacy, international security, international political economy, European integration, globalisation, global environmental politics, international gender politics, regionalism, new wars and the future of conflict and cooperation in world politics, and the political transitions in Central and Eastern Europe, in addition to a detailed examination of the workings of individual countries. On completing a course of study in international studies, students will gain specialised knowledge relating to the major social, cultural, and political issues that dominate the international agenda of world politics.

Students who complete a major in international studies or the Diploma of Arts (International Studies) will have a range of exciting higher degree options enabling them to further their knowledge and qualifications. Graduates from the programs will be attractive prospective employees in the public and private sectors including international inter-governmental and non-governmental organisations.

Requirements for a major

A major in international studies consists of nine 12.5-point subjects selected from the list of subjects offered within the Diploma of Arts (International Studies) totalling 112.5 points. It comprises:

- two first-year subjects (25 points); and
- seven second/third-year subjects (87.5 points).

Diploma of Arts (International Studies)

The Diploma of Arts (International Studies) is only available to students who are currently enrolled in a degree course at the University of Melbourne. It consists of a three-year sequence of study, and adds one year to the duration of your degree.

Students must complete 25 points of first-year subjects and 75 points of second/third-year subjects selected from the lists below. Alternatively, students who have completed appropriate background studies at first year may complete 100 points of second/third-year subjects from the list below.

Description: This subject introduces students to the study of international politics, and provides a foundation for the department's 'international' offerings at second and third year. It deals with issues such as human rights, the environment, North-South relations, inter-civilisational relationships, gender politics, war, proliferation of nuclear weapons, terrorism, nationalism, citizenship, humanitarian intervention amid ethnic conflict, regionalism, and the global political economy. The issue topics will be used to introduce and demonstrate the relevance of the conceptual frameworks of liberal idealism, realism, feminism, transnational democratic theory, critical theory, constructivism, and postcolonialism.

Assessment: Written work totalling 4000 words.

Prescribed texts: A subject reader will be available.
