

Modern Greek

Students at the University of Melbourne are offered a comprehensive undergraduate program in Modern Greek studies at the Parkville campus in conjunction with the Greek studies program at La Trobe University.

The Modern Greek program combines the study of the Greek language, with particular emphasis on the spoken and written language of contemporary Greece, with the study of Greek literature, history, society and culture. First-year subjects combine these aspects, while later-year subjects provide students with the opportunity to pursue more particular areas of interest.

Faculty of Arts requirements

Special enrolment arrangements apply. Students must contact the Faculty of Arts Office for application forms and details.

Studies in Modern Greek may not be undertaken in conjunction with any other cross-institutional course language subjects.

A major in Modern Greek is usually only possible for students who commence Modern Greek study during the first year of their BA. Students commencing Modern Greek during later years may not be able to complete a major in Modern Greek due to the structural constraints of the BA degree.

Language study streams

Three streams of Modern Greek are offered:

beginners

The beginners stream is available to students with little or no prior knowledge of Modern Greek.

intermediate

The intermediate stream is usually only available to students who have undertaken four or five years of secondary school Modern Greek or an approved equivalent but not to those who have completed VCE Modern Greek or an equivalent.

advanced

The advanced stream is only available to students who have obtained at least a pass in VCE Modern Greek or an approved equivalent.

The Hellenic studies program determines the language stream or level in which a student is to enrol. Placement is based on VCE results, other language study records or a placement test.

Stream enrolment remains provisional until confirmed or, alternatively, altered according to the student's needs as determined by the program during the first two weeks of teaching. As far as possible, the program will notify students of any changes to their stream enrolment during the first two weeks of semester. Where a change is made in the third or fourth week of semester it will be reported to the Associate Dean (Academic Programs) at the University of Melbourne. Where changes are made, students must ensure that their enrollment is changed at **both** Universities.

Requirements for a major

A major in Modern Greek usually consists of 125 points comprising:

- three first-year subjects of Modern Greek (37.5 points); and
- two second-year subjects of Modern Greek (37.5 points); and
- third-year subjects of Modern Greek (50 points).

A major must include the subject 922-102 LaTrobe-Greece & the Balkans in 20thC (*p.3*) for students who commenced in 2001 or later.

Honours entry

Honours in Modern Greek must be combined with another area of study within the Faculty of Arts.

The prerequisites for entry to fourth-year combined honours in Modern Greek are:

- completion of all the requirements for the BA; and
- completion of a major in Modern Greek; and
- an average grade of H2B or higher over the second/third-year subjects within the major; and
- admission to honours in the combined area of study.

Entry to honours must be approved by the Modern Greek Program coordinator at the University of Melbourne and the Faculty of Arts honours course adviser.

Honours requirements

Students are not able to study pure honours in Modern Greek at the University of Melbourne. Interested students should consult with the Modern Greek honours coordinator at La Trobe University.

Combined honours

Students undertaking combined honours in Modern Greek and another area of study must complete:

- 922-122 LaTrobe-Modern Greek Thesis (*p.6*) or 922-123 LaTrobe-Modern Greek Thesis (MYE) (*p.6*) (37.5 points); and
- two honours subjects in Modern Greek (25 points); and
- three honours subjects from the combined area of study (37.5 points).

or

- honours thesis in the combined area of study (37.5 points); and
- two honours subjects in the combined area of study (25 points); and
- three honours subjects in Modern Greek (37.5 points).

Studying overseas

Students are encouraged to undertake in-country studies in Greece or Cyprus. Credit may be granted for successful completion of approved subjects. A number of scholarships are also available to assist with expenses. See 922-187 LaTrobe-Study Abroad Program (*p.4*) or *Studying overseas for credit* (*p.8*).

Further study

A BA or BA (Hons) degree in Modern Greek can lead to higher degree study in Modern Greek at La Trobe University and other universities around the world.

Career opportunities

Graduates of the BA who have majored in Modern Greek have found employment as journalists, interpreters, translators, teachers, librarians and in various areas of the public service, commerce and professions serving the large local Greek community.

922-040 LaTrobe-Greek Beginners 1A

Note: Special enrolment arrangements apply. Students must contact the Faculty of Arts Office for application forms and further details. Students intending to complete a major in Modern Greek are also required to take 922-102 LaTrobe-Greece & the Balkans in 20thC (p.3) in Semester 2.

Availability: 1st year

Contact: Two 2-hour practical language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: In this subject students should acquire practical skills in understanding and expressing basic information (such as personal details, needs, wishes, likes/dislikes) in speech and writing. Relevant aspects of contemporary Greek society and culture are also introduced. The emphasis throughout is on practice at listening, reading, speaking and writing Greek in everyday situations and various audio-visual aids are used for this purpose.

Assessment: Regular assignments and class exercises totalling 1200 words, two 1-hour written tests, a 30-minute oral/aural test, and class participation.

922-041 LaTrobe-Greek Beginners 1B

Students intending to complete a major in Modern Greek are also required to take 922-102 LaTrobe-Greece & the Balkans in 20thC (p.3) in Semester 2.

Contact: Two 2-hour practical language classes per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: In this subject, which is a continuation of Greek Beginners 1A, students should learn to handle common interpersonal transactions in Greek with confidence, and to understand and produce (in speech and writing) simple descriptions, narrations and expressions of attitudes and opinions. Relevant aspects of contemporary Greek society and culture are also introduced. The emphasis continues to be on practice at listening, reading, speaking and writing Greek in everyday situations, but students are also introduced to the structure of the language.

Assessment: Regular assignments and class exercises totalling 1200 words, two 1-hour written tests, a 30-minute oral/aural test, and class participation.

Prerequisites: This subject assumes some knowledge of Modern Greek but without having attempted VCE Modern Greek. Students are required to sit a placement test and have permission from the subject coordinator to enrol.

Contact: A 1-hour lecture and a 2-hour practical language class per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: In this subject students discuss issues relating to contemporary Greek and Australian society in Greek, extending their vocabulary and knowledge of grammar as required. Oral and literacy skills are developed primarily through use of media reports, articles and film. On completion of the subject students should be able to discuss in Modern Greek their opinions on a range of basic issues relating to modern Greek culture and society in an informed and coherent manner.

Assessment: Regular assignments and class exercises totalling 1200 words, two 1-hour written tests, a 30-minute oral/aural test, and class participation.

922-102 LaTrobe-Greece & the Balkans in 20thC

Note: Special entry and enrolment conditions apply. Students must consult the Faculty of Arts Office for application forms and further information. This subject must be taken by students intending to complete a major in Modern Greek.

Credit points: 12.5

Contact: A 2-hour lecture and a 1-hour tutorial per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: Students of this subject will study the rise of nation-states in the Balkans and the ways in which political conflict and modernisation in the 20th century have exacerbated ethnic tensions. They will explore the interplay of domestic and international factors in the construction/manipulation of modern, aggressive national ideologies. The focus is on both high politics and their effects on people's lives. Topics include the impact of the Balkan Wars and of World War I; the failure of democracy in the interwar years; Nazi occupation; civil war in Greece and Yugoslavia in the 1940s; the Communist regimes of Yugoslavia and Bulgaria; the Greek junta; the 'Macedonian Question'; and the wars in Yugoslavia in the 1990s. We conclude by evaluating the prospect for democratisation and 'Europeanisation' of the Balkans.

Assessment: A web site review of 500 words, a book review of 1000 words, a research essay of 2000 words, tutorial participation and exercises. Students have the option of taking a 2-hour final exam instead of writing a 2000-word research essay.

922-109 LaTrobe-Greeks in the 20th Century

Semester: Not Offered

Description: This subject examines the political, social and economic institutions of contemporary Greece and Cyprus commencing with the aftermath of the Asia Minor disaster of 1922. Students should become familiar with issues such as the settlement of the refugees and its consequences; the impact on Greek society and culture of a clash between a democratic, a communist and a racially-ordered Europe; Greece's experience in World War II and the origins of the Greek Civil War; unemployment, emigration and the 'economic miracle' of the 1950s and 1960s; urbanisation and rural displacement; the 'oligarchic' parliamentarism of the postwar years and the 1967 military coup; the socialist experiment and europeanisation in the 1980s; the Cyprus question and Greek foreign policy in the 1980s and 1990s; and the role of education and civil society as agents of democratisation and modernisation.

Prerequisites: 922-111 LaTrobe-Greek Beginners 2B (*p.3*) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: A 1-hour lecture and a 3-hour practical class per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: In this subject the Greek conventions for various types of formal discourse are analysed and practised, including formal correspondence, formal reporting, technical description and public announcements. In the process, advanced Greek grammar is studied and practised, and the higher registers of Greek vocabulary introduced. Linguistic skills will also be extended through projects developed and reported on in class, and involving interaction with the local Greek community.

Assessment: A 1000-word assignment, and an essay of 2000 words, a 2-hour written test, and class participation.

922-117 LaTrobe-Creative Writing & Journalism

Prerequisites: 922-115 LaTrobe-Formal Standard Greek (*p.4*) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: A 1-hour lecture and a 3-hour practical class per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: In this subject students analyse, discuss and experiment with various types of Greek creative writing and journalism. Both the general principles and specifically Greek conventions of genre and style are identified, and students are encouraged to think critically about their own and other authors' writing in Greek by drafting, rewriting, editing and transposing the texts. Students' mastery of Modern Greek grammar, vocabulary and usage will be developed in the process. the production of the plays, and video recordings are used for this purpose. Students should complete the subject with the ability to analyse, interpret and discuss a range of Modern Greek theatrical works in an informed and critical manner.

Description: In this subject the concept of 'transterritorial Hellenism' will be discussed by way of an imaginary journey through the cities of Thessaloniki, Izmir, Alexandria, Paris, London, New York and Melbourne. Students will explore the life of Greeks as Ottoman subjects, as merchants, businesspeople, students and scholars, as victims of genocide, as political exiles and guest-workers. Competing visions of Hellenism that developed in these cities will be juxtaposed to the realities of Greece today. Students who complete the subject should appreciate the complexity of the concept of 'Hellenism' and the diversity of its manifestations in various parts of the modern world, and be able to discuss issues of Greek identity in a sophisticated manner.

Contact: A minimum of 80 hours of intensive language instruction in Greece or Cyprus over four to six weeks, and prescribed cultural activities in Greece/Cyprus (*Semester 1, repeat 2, Summer*).

Description: In this subject students undertake an intensive program of formal language-learning and cultural immersion of four to six weeks in duration in Greece or Cyprus. Eligible programs are offered by several Greek universities. If the number of interested students warrants and circumstances allow, the program may be partly taught in Greece/Cyprus by a member of the department's staff. Students enrolling in this subject must pay their own airfares and meet their personal travel, accommodation and living expenses in Greece/Cyprus. Scholarships are available on a competitive basis to assist with such expenses, including the Melbourne Abroad Scholarships (Language Study), and those offered by Greek/Cypriot tertiary institutions. Details are available from the coordinator.

Assessment: Exercises and tests prescribed for in-country language program and a 1500-word diary describing and discussing cultural activities attended in Greece/Cyprus to be submitted by a date specified for each student.
