

Modern Greek

Students at the University of Melbourne are offered a comprehensive undergraduate program in Modern Greek studies at the Parkville campus in conjunction with the Greek studies program at La Trobe University.

The Modern Greek program combines the study of the Greek language, with particular emphasis on the spoken and written language of contemporary Greece, with the study of Greek literature, history, society and culture. First-year subjects combine these aspects, while later-year subjects provide students with the opportunity to pursue more particular areas of interest.

Faculty of Arts requirements

Special enrolment arrangements apply. Students must contact the Faculty of Arts Office for application forms and details.

A major in Modern Greek is usually only possible for students who commence Modern Greek study during the first year of their BA. Students commencing Modern Greek during later years may not be able to complete a major in Modern Greek due to the structural constraints of the BA degree.

Studies in Modern Greek may not be undertaken in conjunction with any other cross-institutional course language subjects.

Language study streams

Three streams of Modern Greek are offered:

Beginners

The beginners stream is available to students with little or no prior knowledge of Modern Greek.

Intermediate

The intermediate stream is usually only available to students who have undertaken four or five years of secondary school Modern Greek or an approved equivalent but not to those who have completed VCE Modern Greek or an equivalent.

Advanced

The advanced stream is only available to students who have obtained at least a pass in VCE Modern Greek or an approved equivalent.

The Greek studies program determines the language stream or level in which a student is to enrol. Placement is based on VCE results, other language study records or a placement test.

Enrolment remains provisional until confirmed or, alternatively, altered according to the student's needs as determined by the program during the first two weeks of teaching. As far as possible, the program will notify students of any changes to their stream enrolment during the first two weeks of semester. Where a change is made in the third or fourth week of semester, it will be reported to the Associate Dean (Academic Programs) at the University of Melbourne. **Where changes are made, students must ensure that their enrollment is changed at both Universities.**

Requirements for a major

A major in Modern Greek usually consists of 125 points comprising:

- three first-year subjects of Modern Greek (37.5 points); and
- two second-year subjects of Modern Greek (37.5 points); and
- third-year subjects of Modern Greek (50 points).

A major should include the subject 922-102 LaTrobe-Greece & the Balkans in 20thC (p.3).

Honours entry

Honours in Modern Greek must be combined with another area of study within the Faculty of Arts.

The prerequisites for entry to fourth-year combined honours in Modern Greek are:

- completion of all the requirements for the BA; and
- completion of a major in Modern Greek; and
- an average grade of H2B or higher over the second/third-year subjects within the major; and
- admission to honours in the combined area of study.

Honours requirements

Students are not able to study pure honours in Modern Greek at the University of Melbourne. Interested students should consult with the Modern Greek honours coordinator at La Trobe University.

Combined honours

Students undertaking combined honours in Modern Greek and another area of study must complete:

- 922-123 LaTrobe-Modern Greek Thesis (p.6) (37.5 points); and
- two honours subjects in Modern Greek (25 points); and
- three honours subjects from the combined area of study (37.5 points).

or

- honours thesis in the combined area of study (37.5 points); and
- two honours subjects in the combined area of study (25 points); and
- three honours subjects in Modern Greek (37.5 points).

Studying overseas

Students are encouraged to undertake in-country studies in Greece or Cyprus. Credit may be granted for successful completion of approved subjects. A number of scholarships are also available to assist with expenses. See 922-187 LaTrobe-Study Abroad Greece/Cyprus (p.5) or *Studying overseas for credit (p.9)*.

Further study

The BA or BA (Honours) specialising in Modern Greek can lead to higher degree study in Modern Greek at La Trobe University and other universities around the world.

Career opportunities

Graduates of the BA who have majored in Modern Greek have found employment as journalists, interpreters, translators, teachers, librarians and in various areas of the public service, commerce and professions serving the large local Greek community.

Enrolment process for La Trobe University subjects

University of Melbourne BA students must contact the Faculty of Arts Office for a Complementary Course enrolment package.

University of Melbourne students from a Faculty other than the Faculty of Arts wishing to enrol in Modern Greek subjects (below) must first seek written approval from their home Faculty to enrol. They should then follow the enrolment steps outlined below. Written approval from the home Faculty should be included in the enrolment package.

Following are step-by-step instructions on how to enrol:

- 1) Collect a Complementary Course enrolment package, available from the Faculty of Arts Office (Ground Floor, Old Arts Building). The pack contains the following:
 - a) Complementary Course Application Form;
 - b) La Trobe University Enrolment Statistics Form;
 - c) Request for Commonwealth Support and HECS-HELP.
- 2) Fill out and submit the completed enrolment package at the Faculty of Arts Office.

FAQs about the Modern Greek program for University of Melbourne students

- **Will I have to travel to La Trobe University to enrol in Modern Greek?**
No. After you have completed the Complementary Course enrolment package, forms will be forwarded to La Trobe University on your behalf.
- **How do I withdraw from Modern Greek subjects once I have enrolled?**
You will need to complete a Variation of Enrolment form for both the University of Melbourne and La Trobe University. Both forms are available from the Faculty of Arts Office at the University of Melbourne. The Faculty will forward the La Trobe University form to La Trobe on your behalf.
- **Can students from a Faculty other than Arts enrol in Modern Greek subjects?**
Yes, provided your home Faculty approves your enrolment in the subjects as they must fit within your course.
- **What fees do I pay?**
You would normally be enrolled in La Trobe University Modern Greek subjects on the same fee-paying basis as the course to which you are crediting the subjects. For example, if you are enrolled in a Bachelor of Arts in a CSP you will be enrolled in Spanish subjects on a HECS-paying basis. For more information on fees at La Trobe University please contact:

Contact: Two 2-hour practical language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: In this subject students should acquire practical skills in understanding and expressing basic information (such as personal details, needs, wishes, likes/dislikes) in speech and writing. Relevant aspects of contemporary Greek society and culture are also introduced. The emphasis throughout is on practice at listening, reading, speaking and writing Greek in everyday situations and various audio-visual aids are used for this purpose.

Assessment: Weekly assignments and class exercises of 1200 words 40% (due throughout the semester), a 1-hour written test 10% (due mid-semester), a 1-hour written test 20% (due at the end of semester) and a 30-minute oral/aural test 30% (due at the end of semester).

in the construction/manipulation of modern, aggressive national ideologies. The focus is on both high politics and their effects on people's lives. Topics include the impact of the Balkan Wars and of World War I; the failure of democracy in the interwar years; Nazi occupation; civil war; the Communist regimes and right-wing dictatorships and the revival of nationalism in the 1990s. We conclude by evaluating the prospect for democratisation and 'Europeanisation' of the Balkans.

Assessment: Two 1000-word tutorial papers 25% each (due on specified dates during semester) and a 2000-word research essay or take-home examination 50% (due two weeks after the end of semester).

Prerequisites: 922-111 LaTrobe-Greek Beginners 2B (p.4) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: A one hour lecture and one 2-hour practical language classes per week (*Semester 1*).

Description: In this subject the Greek conventions for various types of formal discourse are analysed and practised, including formal correspondence, formal reporting, technical description and public announcements. In the process, advanced Greek grammar is studied and practised, and the higher registers of Greek vocabulary introduced. Linguistic skills will also be extended through projects developed and reported on in class, and involving interaction with the local Greek community.

Assessment: Regular assignments and class exercises (1500 words) 30%; one 750-word project (due week 10) 15%; one end of semester 2-hour written test 40%; one end of semester 15-minute oral-aural test 15%. Third-year stu-

dents will be expected to show a greater achievement of discipline-specific skills in their written work than second-year students.

922-117 LaTrobe-Creative Writing & Journalism

Credit points: 18.75

Prerequisites: 922-115 LaTrobe-Formal Standard Greek (*p.4*) or an approved equivalent.

Contact: A one hour lecture and one 2-hour practical language classes per week (*Semester 2*).

Description: In this subject students analyse, discuss and experiment with various types of Greek creative writing and journalism. Both the general principles and specifically Greek conventions of genre and style are identified, and students are encouraged to think critically about their own and other authors' writing in Greek by drafting, rewriting, editing and transposing the texts. Students' mastery of Modern Greek grammar, vocabulary and usage will be developed in the process. Linguistic skills will also be extended through projects developed and reported on in class, and involving interaction with the local Greek community.

Assessment: One 3000-word folio of selected writings (due at end of semester) 60%; one 1500-word critical essay (due week 10) 30%; one 10-minute end of semester oral-aural test 10% Third-year students will be expected to show a greater achievement of discipline-specific skills in their written work than second-year students.

922-187 LaTrobe-Study Abroad Greece/Cyprus

Credit points: 12.5

Prerequisites: Completion of two first-year Modern Greek language subjects with at least an H2B and approval of the subject coordinator.

Contact: A minimum of 80 hours of intensive language instruction in Greece or Cyprus over four to six weeks and prescribed cultural activities in Greece/Cyprus (*Semester 1, repeat 2, Summer*).

Description: In this subject students undertake an intensive program of formal language-learning and cultural immersion of four to six weeks in duration in Greece or Cyprus. Eligible programs are offered by several Greek universities. If the number of interested students warrants and circumstances allow, the program may be partly taught in Greece/Cyprus by a member of the department's staff. Students enrolling in this subject must pay their own airfares and meet their personal travel, accommodation and living expenses in Greece/Cyprus. Scholarships are available on a competitive basis to assist with such expenses, including the Melbourne Abroad Scholarships (Language Study), and those offered by Greek/Cypriot tertiary institutions. Details are available from the coordinator.

Assessment: Exercises and tests prescribed for in-country language program 60%, a 1500-word diary describing and discussing cultural activities attended in Greece/Cyprus 40% (due by a date specified for each student upon their return). Third-year students will be expected to show a greater achievement of discipline-specific skills in their written work than second-year students.

922-188 LaTrobe-Varieties of Modern Greek
