

**R6.158 - THE ALLAN SCHOLARSHIP****Recitals-**

- A. Viola Allan, Music Teacher, of Horsham in the State of Victoria who died on 16 September 1971 devised and bequeathed the whole of her estate to one Dorothy Hill, also of Horsham.
- B. Dorothy Hill, on 4 May 1973 , presented to the University the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of founding a scholarship to be known as “the Allan Scholarship” in memory of Viola Allan for the encouragement of the study of the piano.
- C. The sum of \$2,000 increased to \$2,994 at 31 December 1994.

It is provided as follows -

- 1. The sum of \$2,994 and any accumulations and additions to the sum forms a fund called the "Allan Scholarship Fund" ("the fund") and the fund must be paid into an investment pool and remain there until the Council directs otherwise.
- 2. The Council has an absolute discretion in the investment of the fund and may add to the sum from time to time from any other sources as the Council in its absolute discretion deems appropriate.
- 3. The scholarship is awarded to a student who is qualified to pursue the course for the degree of bachelor of Music or bachelor of Music Education and who is pursuing or desires to pursue piano studies.
- 4. The scholarship is awarded by the Council after report from the dean of the faculty of Music ("the faculty"). Before making such report the dean may appoint a committee to advise him or her from such members of the faculty as the dean in his or her absolute discretion deems appropriate.
- 5. In making such report preference is to be given to eligible students whose permanent home is within a radius of 50 miles from the township of Horsham in the State of Victoria.
- 6. The scholarship is open for award from time to time whenever the income of the capital of the fund is deemed sufficient by the Council.
- 7. The value of the scholarship is such sum as the Council from time to time determines.

8. The tenure of the scholarship is one year but the Council on the recommendation of the dean of the faculty may in particular cases extend such tenure by a further period not exceeding one year.
9. If at any time the Council is of the opinion that the scholar is not pursuing his or her work satisfactorily, the scholarship may be terminated.
