**Mr Ian Renard** became Chancellor of the University of Melbourne on 1 January 2005, having been elected to the position by the 21-member University of Melbourne Council. Mr Renard is an Arts and Law graduate of the University, sharing

the Supreme Court Prize in 1969 and obtaining a Master of Laws in 1972. He was a partner in commercial law with the Melbourne firm Arthur Robinson & Hedderwicks for 22 years, and managing partner from 1989 to 1991. He also served for some years as President of the State Library and as Chair of the Melbourne Theatre Company. He is now a Director of a number of public companies.

**Professor Glyn Davis** is Vice-Chancellor of the University of Melbourne and Chair of the Group of Eight, representing Australia's leading research universities. He was educated at the University of New South Wales and the Australian National University, before undertaking post-doctoral work as a Harkness Fellow at the University of California Berkeley, the Brookings Institution and Harvard. Professor Davis teaches and researches in the field of public policy. His public sector service includes a term as the Director-General of the Department of Premier and Cabinet in Queensland, and appointment as Foundation Chair of the Australia and New Zealand School of Government. Professor Davis is a Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia and a Companion in the Order of Australia.



**Dr Andrew Cuthbertson** is the Chief Scientific Officer at CSL Limited. Dr Cuthbertson completed his medical training at the University of Melbourne, followed by a PhD in Immunology at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute. He then spent considerable time conducting research first at the Howard Florey Institute, followed by the National Institute of Health and Genentech in the United States. Dr Cuthbertson was recruited to CSL Limited in 1997 as Research Director under Professor Ian Gust, and succeeded Professor Gust as R&D Director in March 2000. At this time he was also appointed Chief Scientific Officer of the company. He has a keen interest in biotechnology drug development, particularly in the emerging field of immunotherapy for infectious diseases and cancer.



**Dr Vicki Lawson** is a senior research officer in the Department of Pathology with a research group investigating prion diseases (the cause of 'mad cow disease'). She is a Science graduate of the University of Melbourne. After completing a PhD at The

Burnet Institute, investigating the disease transmission and pathogenesis of HIV, she undertook postdoctoral training in prion diseases as a Fogarty International Fellow at the Rocky Mountain Laboratories, National Institutes of Health, USA. She returned to Australia and the Department of Pathology in 2002 as a NHMRC Howard Florey Centenary Fellow. Her research is focused on understanding the determinants of susceptibility to prion diseases and developing effective prion decontamination methodologies, which reduce the risk of prion disease transmission in a medical setting. She is a mother of two and has recently returned from maternity leave.

**Lin Jiang** started playing the horn at the age of 10 and now he is one of the most recognised horn players in Australia. He has performed solos with numerous professional Australian orchestras, and next year, he will be performing his first international solo engagement with the Auckland Symphony Orchestra. Jiang has also recently released his first solo album of the complete Mozart concertos for horn under the baton of Barry Tuckwell with the Western Australian Symphony Orchestra. Two more CDs are soon to be released under ABC and Melba Records respectively. Jiang just completed his Bachelor of Music with honours and plans to further his studies in Germany.



The music played at the beginning of this evening was performed by string quartet, the **Lucca Ensemble** who are four dedicated professional young musicians based in Melbourne.
