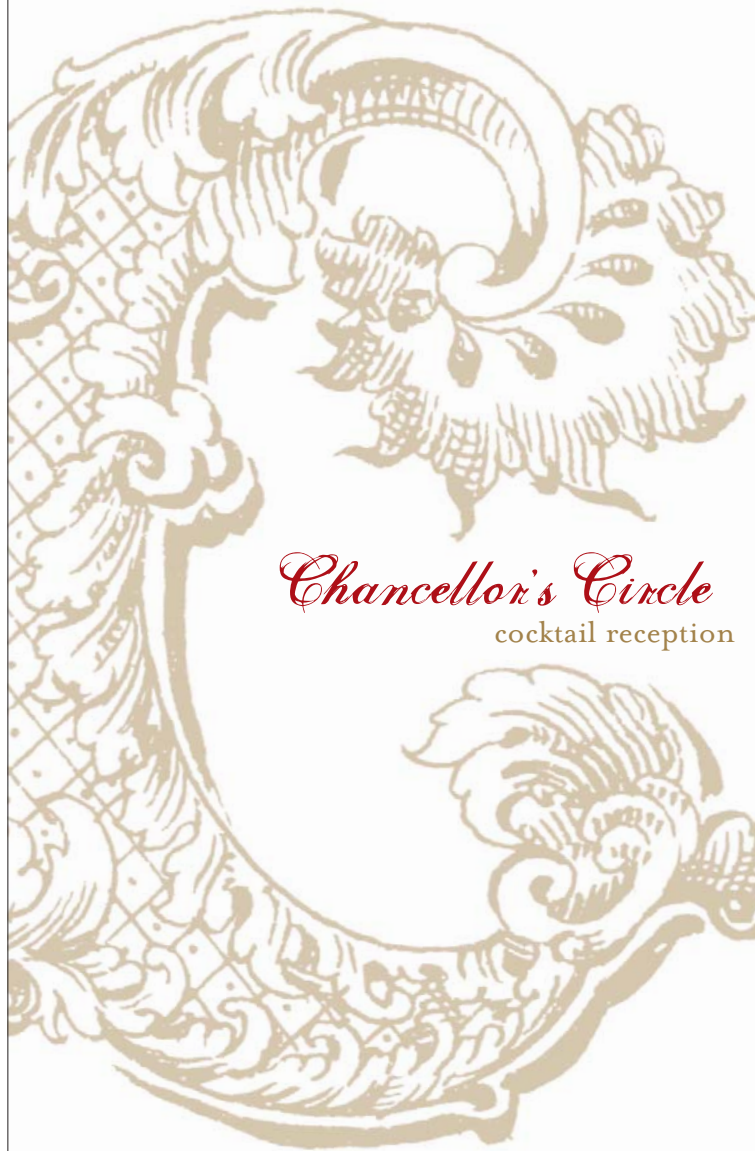

**MR IAN RENARD** became Chancellor of the University of Melbourne on 1 January 2005, having been elected to the position by the 21-member University of Melbourne Council. Mr Renard was an Arts and Law student at Melbourne, sharing the Supreme

Court Prize in 1969 and obtaining a Master of Laws in 1972. He was a partner in commercial law with the Melbourne firm Arthur Robinson & Hedderwicks for 22 years, and managing partner from 1989 to 1991. He also served for some years as President of the State Library and as Chair of the Melbourne Theatre Company. He is now a Director of a number of public companies. As Chancellor, an important focus for Mr Renard is working with the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Glyn Davis, to ensure that the teaching and learning experience for all students at Melbourne is stimulating and invigorating, that our research is of world-class standard, and that this is the university in Australia where first-class staff most want to work.



**PROFESSOR GLYN DAVIS** is Vice-Chancellor of the University of Melbourne and President of the Group of Eight, representing Australia's leading research universities. He was educated at the University of New South Wales and the Australian National

University, before undertaking post-doctoral work as a Harkness Fellow at the University of California Berkeley, the Brookings Institution and Harvard. Professor Davis teaches and researches in the field of public policy. His public sector service includes a term as the Director-General of the Department of Premier and Cabinet in Queensland, and appointment as Foundation Chair of the Australia and New Zealand School of Government. Professor Davis is a Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia and a Companion in the Order of Australia.

#### STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

**TIMOTHY KERN** is currently undertaking the sixth year of a Law and Commerce Double Degree and a Diploma of Modern Languages in German and French. He has just returned from a year long exchange during which he studied law and languages at the University of Heidelberg (Germany) and McGill University (Canada).

Tim spent the summer teaching at a tribal school in Kenya. During his time in Africa he founded Global Aid Partnerships (GAPS) an NGO with numerous projects in Africa in the areas of education, rural development, health and microfinance. Upon graduation, he would like to pursue a career in either consulting or international law.



**SHIRLEY GODWIN** is an Aboriginal woman from Western Australia. She is one of 9 siblings and proud aunt and great aunt to 20 nieces and nephews. Shirley returned to full-time study at the University of Melbourne in 2006 having previously completed two applied science degrees, in Medical Laboratory Science and Indigenous Community Health. She has an extensive background in health research, firstly in biomedical experimental research at the Baker Medical Research Institute, then as a National Research Program Manager with the Cooperative Research Centre for Aboriginal Health. She is currently undertaking 2nd year Medicine as a graduate entry student and holds the Edward J Darbyshire scholarship.

**HANNAH COLEMAN** is a fourth year Bachelor of Music/Arts student, majoring in music performance, English literature and history. Hannah began studying the recorder at ten years of age, and in 2004 continued her studies at the University conservatorium under the guidance of Genevieve Lacey and Ruth Wilkinson. In 2005, she was awarded the Music Faculty's Ormond Exhibition for the best student in the second year. Hannah performs a range of early music at venues throughout Melbourne, and in 2007 will perform as soloist with the University of Melbourne Orchestra.
