THE DWIGHT PRIZES**

**Draft UTR Amendment to Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry & Health Sciences for approval
2 September 2020**

Amendment of University trust record 6.5 certified by the General Counsel on the advice of the Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry & Health Sciences - To govern the Dwight Prizes.

The record as currently in force needs to be amended because the current eligibility for the Psychology stream no longer reflects the cohort competing in the final assessment. Since 2019, the fourth-year program has included students from four degree programs.

It is proposed that the record be amended as follows-

- *The eligibility in the 'Dwight Final Assessment Prize' for Psychology be amended to include the bachelor of Biomedicine (Honour) and the Graduate Diploma in Psychology (Advanced)*

The amendment of the record is intended to facilitate the administration by the University of the trust established by the bequest in a manner that is consistent with the trust terms.

The proposed amendment of the record does not require the sanction of the Attorney-General for Victoria or the Supreme Court of Victoria as the amendment of the operative provisions of the record-

- *relates to the administrative arrangements for the implementation and ongoing performance of the trust terms, as determined by the University from time to time; and*
- *is within the trust terms.*

The faculty has-

- *confirmed that it has provided all details required to prepare this proposed amendment of the record; and*
- *approved the contents of this document and the amendment of the record.*

Proposed Amendment

UTR 6.5 – THE DWIGHT PRIZES

UTR6.5 - THE DWIGHT PRIZES

Background

- A. By Will dated 13 January 1869, Henry Tolman Dwight (**Donor**) bequeathed all his real estate in the Colony of Victoria and the proceeds of his personal estate, on the death of his wife, to the University (**Bequest**) for the purpose of establishing a perpetual trust, the income of which was to be applied as follows –

‘ ...to divide the annual income thereof into money prizes of not less than twenty five pounds each to be given by the said trustees for the advancement and encouragement of learning in Ancient History Constitutional and Legal History and Natural Philosophy or for such other branches of the University education as the said trustees may in their discretion think the prizes most applicable and advantageous which several prizes it is my will and desire shall be called the ‘Dwight Prize’ in such said particular branch or branches of learning or others in which there shall be annual or other examinations and to which the said trustees shall judge such prizes beneficial as a stimulant to students and a fit reward to the ablest scholar competing therefor.’

- B. The Donor was a photographer, bookseller and publisher who migrated from London to Melbourne in 1855 and opened a bookshop at 234 Bourke Street Melbourne. He died on 13 June 1871.
- C. The University accepted the Bequest upon the trusts specified by the donor, and the bequest therefore became the capital subject to those trusts (Capital Sum).
- D. This University trust record is the means by which the University records –
- (1) the trusts specified by the Donor upon which the University as trustee holds trust property, including the Capital Sum; and
 - (2) the administrative arrangements for the implementation and ongoing performance of those trusts, as determined by the University from time to time.

The trust terms and administrative arrangements governing the Bequest are as follows.

Trust Terms

1. The Capital Sum, all income arising from the Capital Sum, and any accumulations and additions thereto together form a fund called ‘The Dwight Prizes’ (**Fund**).
2. The Fund is to be paid into one or more investment common funds and remain there until Council directs otherwise.

3. As trustee of the Fund, the University is obliged by the trusts specified by the donor-

- (1) to establish a perpetual trust;
- (2) to award prizes of not less than twenty five pounds each for the advancement and encouragement of learning in Ancient History Constitutional and Legal History and Natural Philosophy disciplines as determined by the University; and
- (3) to call each prize a 'Dwight Prize'.

Administrative Arrangements

4. Until its further determination, and in order to implement the trust terms, the University has determined-

- (1) to establish twelve prizes, each called a 'Dwight Prize' in the relevant subject for which it is awarded;
- (2) that each 'Dwight Prize' will be-
 - (i) awarded annually in the following subjects
 - (ii) open to for competition on an annual basis as set out below
 - (iii) of the corresponding value as set out below, and
 - (iv) administered by the corresponding faculty as set out below

(3) to establish seven prizes, each called a 'Dwight Final Assessment Prize', to be awarded annually to a candidate who is presenting in the relevant discipline at honours level for the first time, as follows –

5. As provided in section 43 of the Act, Council has delegated its power to make awards to the dean of the relevant faculty responsible for the administration of each of the prizes set out above, but this does not extend to Council's powers and responsibilities as set out in section 2.
6. The dean of each of the relevant faculties is authorised to award each prize on behalf of the University.
