Climate change is affecting the health of individuals and communities. Yet we have limited knowledge on how policymakers consider health when they develop such policies.

We are seeking Victorian state and local policymakers working on such policies to examine current approaches to considering health in climate policy development beyond the health sector.

Participants will be asked to join an interview or focus group discussion to take place at a mutually agreed time and location.

Participants will also be invited to help co-design tools and resources to support policymakers to develop healthier climate policies.
